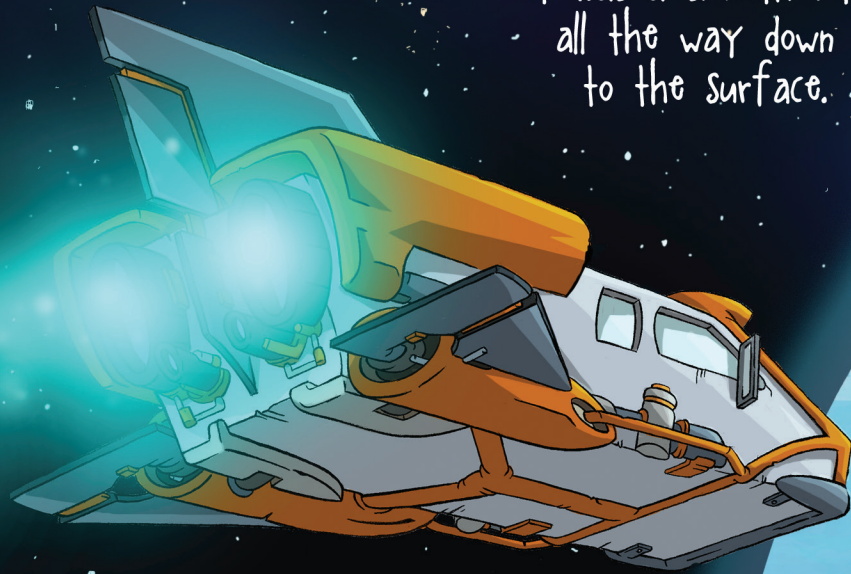

Using a small jet pack, I soared up the Budwood trees.

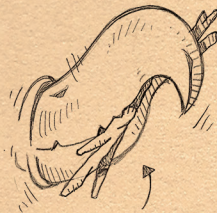
Soon I spotted an Egoful in its nest.

The Egoful loved having its picture taken.

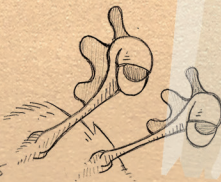
In fact I could not snap a shot without the Egoful in some sort of pose.
