Preface

Leopold's passions and philosophy had been passed from professor to student to professor to student, again and again. Though land resource related problems and human impacts have grown exponentially from 1940's his message still rings clear to every new situation regarding Leopold's precious land.

I was told that Leopold required writing courses in the curriculum of his graduate students. They knew the special importance of his words and philosophy must be heard, understood, and spread throughout the world. The prominence of his words has been perceived and carried forward into an environmental movement, conservation preservation efforts, and laws. Though he foresaw our predicament of this failing earth and knew the reasons why, he still had hope we could shift our values to see land as a community not as a commodity.

During these 1970's college days we used to have conversations on what will save the "land". Will it be Leopold's Land

Ethic or environmental laws? For the last forty years we have witnessed many laws passed that have helped to save the land, but as with greed and politics it is man's cultural ethics in the long run that are important to life.

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
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
