
Swifty said, "Don't worry Mr. Whoopsies, I'm sure the mail is somewhere around here"

Swifty replied, "You as well, Ms. Peggy, but today I am afraid we come to you about a crime"




"Would you happen to see or hear who might have taken Mr. Whoopsies' mail sometime last night?"

## **Knowledge Box: Plover**

There are close to 36 species of plovers! These birds can be described as being around 6-12 inches long, having long wing spans, short necks, and being plump-breasted. The plover is largely considered a shorebird, although some species are found in the Grasslands. They can be seen running around quickly to look for food, which mainly consists of insects, worms, snails, and water beetles.

These birds are also known as "Piping Plovers" due to the bell-like whistles that they make to distinguish themselves and make themselves visible.

Adult plovers sometimes pretend to have a broken wing in order to draw attention away from their chicks when a predator is nearby.
