INTRODUCTION

In 2010 I published *Cads, Princes and Best Friends,* a memoir in which I shared the journey of self-discovery that followed the break-up of a decade long love relationship when I was in my mid-thirties, and my subsequent attempts to find love again.

During the time expressed in that story, I had been inexperienced at dating even as an adult. I had a lot of questions and made a lot of mistakes. My interactions with men while searching for a mate were "learn by trial and error." PART I

WHAT IS A RELATIONSHIP?

Regardless of how much perceptions and beliefs have changed over time, one universal truth remains: human connection, especially the romantic kind, helps us move from the "not good" of being alone to the "very good."

RELATIONSHIP - WHAT IS IT?

Relationship is one of those topics that prompts most people's ears to perk up and listen. Humans are wired to desire relationships with others, starting with the familial, then with friends and business associates and ultimately, with a romantic partner.

Most single people profess to want to be in a romantic relationship of their own, and preferably a long lasting, fulfilling one. People are looking for genuine connections. The survey, *Dating & Relationships in the 2020s*, revealed some interesting facts, as shown by the responses from single men and women:

- 72% of women and 90% of men said they were ready for a serious long-term partnership or marriage.
- 73% of women and 43% of men based their readiness on their desire for a long-term partnership.
- 66% of women and 47% of men wanted personal connection.

Respondents were also asked of their preference, given a choice of dating situations for the rest of their life.

- 46% of women and 22% of men chose casual dating with different people.
- 89% of women and 79% of men picked serious long-term relationship with a life mate.

It is to be noted that some people were open to both casual and serious dating, although most respondents felt ready for a serious relationship, fueled by the desire to achieve long-term partnership or marriage. A big surprise for me was that the percentages for men on those items were as high as they were.

Does this reveal an underlying misconception or a commonly uninformed assumption that men are non-committal and just want to remain casual? These answers seem to suggest otherwise.

We've discovered a common ground between men and women: irrespective of gender, individuals seek long-term relationships that offer personal fulfillment.

How can you acquire that coveted treasure known as a relationship? Is it merely luck, where the perfect one falls in your lap, or is there a method to improve your chances of attaining and sustaining a joyful and fulfilling partnership with a significant other?

While the pathways and the approaches used may be different for everyone, there are some basic and fundamental strategies that universally ensure success for a love relationship.

What is a relationship?

The first thing to know about anything you want to get involved in is, what is it? What are you getting into? What, exactly is a "relationship?"

There seems to be a serious lack of knowledge among the younger generation as to what that is. During a conversation about the upcoming book with my good friend Charles F* 1 a married man in his fifties, he found this generation "cognitively challenged" when it came to understanding true relationships. - I used my own euphemism instead of repeating the real (R) word he used, to be politically correct. In any case, a good number of people, especially millennials, who are used to adjusting their ubiquitous selfies to desired effect, fail to realize a few things:

- o Life and people are not perfect.
- $\circ\quad \mbox{You cannot edit people or situations to your liking in a relationship.}$
- o It's not all about you. There are two souls involved in a relationship.
- You may not get the perfect shot for your reel, but you choose the best picture among the lot that is suitable for the situation.

I wrote a blog in October of 2023, when I came back from a vacation in Cancun, Mexico, titled, "Look At me! – The Perils of Self-Absorption." In it I discussed what I saw as an alarming trend of people so absorbed in taking selfies that they paid no attention to the beautiful scenery that surrounded

them. Their objective was solely to find a spot that *showcased* them. A background that made them look good. Mother Nature got no flowers for her works. God received no glory for his creation. The gorgeous views were not even acknowledged with a second glance.

A lot of that self-absorption goes on in relationships today. The partner is overlooked and viewed solely as a backdrop to make one look good. People fail to see that a relationship is an exchange of emotions with everything that it entails. The self-analysis, the give and take, the compromises, the what is best for us, and the occasional "you come first."

In the dating phase, there is the discovery of each other that is fundamental in determining whether a relationship is viable or not. Some people are so focused on themselves that they sabotage any chances of something developing between them and the prospect.

When I was working on this section of the book, in October 2023, news of a TikTok post by an Atlanta influencer flooded the internet. This woman being pursued by a suitor had finally agreed to meet him for drinks. But once at the restaurant, she proceeded to order 48 oysters that she slurped down while filming herself. By the time she ordered an additional potatoes and crab cakes entree, the date had left the building under the guise of going to the restroom. When she texted him later, offended that she was left stuck with the high bill, he offered to Cashapp her the total for the drinks he had originally offered.

The whole thing went viral: her post voicing her outrage at the date for walking out on her and the public reposting the incident in crowded discussion threads. As expected, the comments from men were mostly derogatory toward her, with some feeling it was outrageous to even eat that much of anything, to exhibit bad manners for slurping or act that way on a first date. There were the women who felt that a guy should never walk out on a bill.

I have a few issues with this whole scenario.

 Being an influencer can be a good thing when someone uses their platform to promote a cause: save the whales, abolish genital mutilation, save the planet; share inspiring or meaningful messages. However, too many employ their position of influence to showcase themselves, even when it is in bad taste. "See me here. See me there."

- What are you doing filming yourself during a first date when you should be engaging the other person to get to know each other? This is that self-absorbed malady I referred to in my blog *Look at Me!* The date became a backdrop to showcase herself, instead of an exercise in making a genuine connection.
- If your objective is to make this man spend on you when you don't even know his financial capabilities, how do you think that projects? Are you going to spend the bills money on designer shoes and expect him to just deal with it?
- o If you cannot give this person your full attention for the few minutes that you are on a date, how can he depend on you for conversations, for togetherness, for support?

I could go on about what was wrong with that picture. Public opinion was vocal about it. A man wanting some arm candy or a chance to showcase himself might associate with such a woman to be in the limelight with her. But if one is looking for genuine connection and a true relationship, they will do like that guy.

Skedaddle. Skip out. Get out of town. RUN!

Let me put on my teacher hat for a minute.

To get a better understanding of a word meaning or application, it is helpful to look at its given definition. The *Merriam Webster Dictionary* has several definitions for the word "relationship."

- 1. The state of being related or interrelated as in a relationship between weather patterns and global warming.
- 2. *The relation connecting or binding participants in a relationship* such as kinship or familial connections.

- 3. A state of affairs existing between those having relations or dealings a business connection or diplomatic interaction between countries, for example.
- 4. *A romantic or passionate attachment* the kind that most people associate with the word relationship.

When it comes to dating or marriage, the default definition is commonly number four: a romantic attachment. However, all of *Webster's* definitions fit the premise of a romantic relationship, as all those elements come into play.

Indulge me if you will, while I break it down a bit.

1. The state of being related or interrelated – In a relationship, what happens to one affects the other. For example, if one snores, the other risks having a sleepless night! Believe me, I know. I have woken up to my husband upside down on the bed because I was snoring in his face. Go figure! The man will chance a foot kicking his chest, but at least he might get some sleep that night.

<u>Real Talk:</u> Seriously now, being in a relationship means that everything about one person has a reaction on the other. This could be a positive effect or a negative one. Relationships do not exist in a vacuum.

2. The relation connecting or binding participants in a relationship – In a familial relationship you know exactly where character traits come from and everyone is accepted as kin even when their name is prefaced with the word "crazy."

<u>Real Talk:</u> A romantic relationship inherently requires that two people accept each other as is and adopt each other as kin.

3. A state of affairs existing between those having relations or dealings – A lot of dealings goes on in a love relationship, as in "deal with it." In dating and in marriage there is a lot of give and take that most people do not foresee or choose to ignore. The expression "state of affairs" could not be more

appropriate to describe the status or process. Dating and marriage are akin to a business endeavor!

Since when is romance a business, you may ask?

Yes, it is! A romantic relationship should be looked at as a merger of two individuals, with the expectations, discussions, and compromises that come with establishing the ground work for the successful joining of separate entities.

Dating, marriage, and business have a lot in common. Stay with me for a minute and you'll see how all three situations have similar components.

When you are seeking a job, you are the suitor. You prepare a resume that lists your qualifications and education, your experiences and what you are looking for. The employer (the pursued) prepares their own list of what they are looking for and what they are offering (salary, benefits, growth, etc.)
